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# INTRODUCTION

## DISSATISFACTION AND FRUSTRATION ABOUNDED LAST FALL AS THE 2018 REGULAR LEGISLATIVE SESSION APPROACHED.

Governor Mary Fallin called the legislature into special session to close an FY18 budget gap of over \$200 million leftover from the 2017 regular session. The legislature closed that gap by reducing budgets to over 50 state agencies through the use of one-time monies and adjourned the special session, however the Governor vetoed the legislation and called a second special session which convened concurrently with the 2018 regular session.

In response to the budget shortfall, and the need to raise revenue to provide a salary increase for teachers, a plan was developed and proposed by a bipartisan coalition of business and community leaders from throughout Oklahoma. Known as the Step-Up Oklahoma Plan, the bill (HB 1033xx) provided for a cigarette, little cigar, smokeless tobacco, gasoline and diesel fuel, gross production and wind tax levy and incentives. The bill was estimated to raise over \$580 million in new revenue, however, as a revenue raising measure, the bill required a three-fourths majority vote (76 votes) in the House. The bill only received 63 votes.

The failure of the Step-Up Oklahoma Plan led to weeks of intense, and often heated negotiations, to raise enough revenue to close the FY18 budget gap, and provide for a teacher pay raise. Additionally, a two-week teacher walkout occurred in April that placed intense focus on legislators. Prior to the walkout, the legislature passed and Governor Fallin signed a revenue bill (HB 1010xx) increasing the state tax on cigarettes by \$1.00 per pack, raising to 5% the gross production tax on oil and natural gas on the first 36 months of production, raising the excise tax on gasoline and diesel by three and six cents per gallon respectively and allowing tribal casinos to institute the use of ball and dice for roulette and craps. The bill is expected to raise over \$470 million in new revenue, most of which will be allocated to the teacher pay raise, new textbooks and additional classroom support.

The length and intensity of the budget negotiations resulted in an anomaly to 2018 RIED scores due to the large number of votes missed by legislative leaders involved in negotiations. For example, the chairman of the House Appropriations Committee missed over half of the votes scored by RIED. The chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee missed one-third of the votes. Because RIED scores are based on votes aligned with RIED positions, missing votes led to some legislators receiving failing scores where they would otherwise have received very high scores.

Another issue created the lowest number of perfect RIED scores in many years. While Second

Amendment rights are important to Oklahomans, SB 1212 would permit the open, unlicensed carry of firearms to all persons over 21 years of age that are not otherwise unqualified to purchase a firearm. This bill eliminates the training requirements for persons carrying a firearm in Oklahoma, and it also reduces the level of the background check necessary to carry a firearm. In her veto message, Governor Fallin wrote, *'SB 1212 eliminates the current ability of Oklahoma law enforcement to distinguish between those carrying guns who have been trained and vetted and those who have not.'* SB 1212 posed a threat to businesses currently operating in Oklahoma, and creates a barrier to some businesses that might be looking to relocate to Oklahoma.

Criminal justice reform has worked its way into Oklahoma businesses. The rising cost of incarceration is forcing the state to act before the federal government takes over our jails and prisons, and assesses large tax increases to make changes. Oklahoma can either raise taxes to build more jails and prisons or reform our criminal justice system. To that end, the legislature passed four measures, HB 2881, HB 2886, SB 649 and SB 689, designed to reduce the prison population by reducing sentences for crimes, revising the parole process and allowing judges more discretion for sentencing offenders to treatment and supervision programs. This is a positive beginning for more modern, fair and proper treatment of those who so desperately need help, and it should make Oklahoma a better place to live and conduct business.

Given the turmoil surrounding the 2018 legislative session, the legislature still passed legislation that will prove beneficial to Oklahoma businesses. Significant legislation included the creation of the Quick Action Closing Fund (HB 3324), expansion of the Small Employer Quality Jobs Incentive Act (SB 923), Creation of the Occupational Licensing Advisory Commission (SB 1475) and protection of our military bases (SB 1576) from encroachment.

I am pleased with legislators who kept their focus on the passage of pro-business legislation, and I am especially happy with the support of freshmen legislators who seem increasingly interested in growing Oklahoma businesses through quality legislation. The 2019 legislative session will include over 50 new members, and Oklahoma needs senators and representatives to continue to support legislation that create jobs, expand businesses and attract new commerce to Oklahoma.

I appreciate your continued support of the Research Institute for Economic Development and look forward to next session.

## BILL SCORING AND EVALUATION

### BILL SELECTION

Proposed legislation relating to business, job creation, elevation of income or economic growth can be nominated for evaluation.

Nominations come from business interests, chambers of commerce, trade organizations, professional societies, academic interests, individuals and members of the legislature.

### WEIGHTING

Bills are weighed on a scale from five to twenty with the most important legislation from this session receiving the highest weight. RIED staff reviews each bill and assigns an initial score. A private sector focus group comprised of RIED board members and representatives in the fields related to the proposed legislation follows the bill through the legislative process and issues a final recommendation. A committee made up of RIED board members or their designee meets to evaluate the bills being considered as well as to approve the bills used for final scoring.

### BILL LIST

Legislators receive the current RIED bill list:

- After the first committee deadline date
- After the deadline to hear bills in their chamber of origin
- After the second committee deadline date
- After the deadline to hear bills in the opposite chamber
- Periodic updates are sent as bills are signed out of the conference committees (daily if necessary)

### CALCULATION OF MEMBER VOTES

Approximately 20 of the most significant business related bills are used in calculating the final scores.

- Unless otherwise noted, legislative votes used for final scoring are the votes cast on final reading in both legislative chambers
- Member scores are determined by dividing individual points by the maximum number of points available
- Points are not deducted for absences. Absences do, however, represent a lost opportunity to score points. Co-authorship of a bill will be considered as voting in favor of the legislation.

## HOUSE BILLS

### HB 1568

**+5**

**By Echols/Cockroft (House) & Thompson (Senate)**

Authorizes the Department of Commerce to develop a program to purchase existing tax credits from owners who cannot use them to offset a tax liability. The purpose of the bill was for companies to take advantage of earned tax credits and allow the state to retire those existing credits. In her veto message, Governor Fallin said the purpose of the tax credits were to offset a company's tax liability, not to become a cash payment.

*Do Pass 62-13 House; 29-12 Senate; vetoed by the Governor*

### HB 2281

**By O'Donnell (House) & Treat/Pittman/Rader (Senate)**

Alters the penalties for numerous crimes related to low-level property offenses like larceny and forgery. This bill, along with HB 2286, SB 649 and SB 689 made up a package of justice reform designed to reduce the prison population in Oklahoma.

*Do Pass 80-3 House; 40-0 Senate; signed by the Governor*

### HB 2775

**By Osburn (House) & Pugh (Senate)**

Sets the payment of interest on the proceeds from the sale of the production of oil and gas to the prime rate reported in the Wall Street Journal on or after November 18, 2018. This bill maintains interest payments at market rates rather than a sum set in statute.

*Do Pass 62-25 House; 46-0 Senate; signed by the Governor*

### HB 2987

**+10**

**By McEntire/Cockroft (House) & Yen/Pittman (Senate)**

Relates to the Physician Manpower Training Commission by expanding it to include physician assistants and allowing the Commission to waive maximum rural population criteria for persons working to repay scholarships. This is intended to help expand healthcare in rural Oklahoma, making it a better place to live and work.

*Do Pass 65-9 House; 40-3 Senate; signed by the Governor*

### HB 3324

**+20**

**By Fetgatter/Cockroft/Hall/West, Josh (House) & Bice/Sharp/Pittman (Senate)**

Creates the Quick Action Closing Fund and establishes rules and standards for collection and conduct of funds related to the Quality Jobs Act. The result of this bill should allow the Governor to attract more businesses and jobs to Oklahoma.

*Do Pass 63-14 House; 35-7 Senate; signed by the Governor*

### HB 1033XX

**+20**

**By Wallace/Casey (House) & David/Fields (Senate)**

Known as the Step-Up Oklahoma plan, it provides for a cigarette, little cigar, smokeless tobacco, gasoline and diesel fuel, gross production and wind tax levy and incentives. The bill was developed and proposed by a bipartisan coalition of business and community leaders from throughout Oklahoma. As a revenue raising measure, the bill required a three-fourths vote (76 votes) for passage. After failing to receive 76 votes in the House, the bill moved to the Senate where it was completely amended and held.

# BILL DESCRIPTION

## SENATE BILLS

### SB 649

+10

**By Treat/Sharp/Pittman (Senate) & O'Donnell/Cleveland/McBride (House)**

Reduces the amount of extra prison time that nonviolent offenders would get for being repeat offenders. This bill, along with HB 2281, HB 2286 and SB 689 made up a package of justice reform designed to reduce the prison population in Oklahoma.

*Do Pass 39-1 Senate; 84-9 House; signed by the Governor*

### SB 689

**By Treat/Sharp/Iech/Pittman (Senate) & O'Donnell/Cleveland/McBride/Young (House)**

Gives judges and prosecutors more discretion and options for sending people to treatment and supervision programs instead of prison and reducing fines and fees for some offenders. This bill, along with HB 2281, HB 2286 and SB 649 made up a package of justice reform designed to reduce the prison population in Oklahoma.

*Do Pass 39-1 Senate; 76-13 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 883

**By Thompson (Senate) & Montgomery (House)**

Extends the timeframe to claim the tax credit to offset the amount of the guaranty fee paid by banking associations and credit unions to the United Small Business Administration through January 1, 2022. This bill extends the sunset provision for three additional years.

*Do Pass 45-0 Senate; 74-14 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 923

**By Thompson (Senate) & Osborn (House)**

Increases the number of employees allowed to qualify for incentives from the Small Employer Quality Jobs Incentive Act from no more than 90 employees to 500. This gives the Oklahoma Department of Commerce more flexibility to attract new jobs to Oklahoma.

*Do Pass 42-2 Senate; 75-17 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1114

+10

**By Bergstrom (Senate) & O'Donnell/Lepak (House)**

Designates certain roadways as high-wide load corridors. This bill will prevent any entity from installing a structure along the corridor that will obstruct oversized vehicles without authorization from the Oklahoma Department of Transportation. The result of this should enable Oklahoma manufacturers to more easily deliver their goods via Oklahoma's ports and navigable waterways.

*Do Pass 44-0 Senate; 91-0 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1162

**By David (Senate) & Mulready/Cockroft (House)**

Repeals the authority of the Board of Directors of the Oklahoma Individual Health Insurance Market Stabilization Program to levy assessments on health insurers and replaces it with the authority to apply for federal funds for the reinsurance program. The result of this bill should be lower health insurance costs.

*Do Pass 36-6 Senate; 52-36 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1212

**By Dahm/Brecheen/Silk/Leewright/Murdock (Senate) & Roberts (Sean)/Calvey/Enns/Faught/Murphey/Bennett (John)/ O'Donnell/Coody/Strohm/Babinec/McEachin/McDugle/Lawson/Humphrey/Hilbert/Gann/Frix/Downing/Derby/West (Kevin)/West (Josh)/West (Rick)/Tadlock/Jordan/McBride/Cleveland/Moore/Russ (House)**

Permits open, unlicensed carry of firearms to all persons over 21 years of age that are not otherwise unqualified to purchase a firearm. This bill eliminates the training currently required to obtain a concealed carry permit. It also reduces the level of the background check necessary to carry a gun. In her veto message, Governor Fallin wrote, "SB 1212 eliminates the current ability of Oklahoma law enforcement to distinguish between those carrying guns who have been trained and vetted and those who have not."

*Do Pass 32-11 Senate; 59-28 House; vetoed by Governor*

### SB 1249

**By Leewright (Senate) & Mulready (House)**

Removes the liability from the primary contractors if subcontractors fail to secure workers' compensation coverage and also reimplements the Affidavit of Exempt Status. This bill allows subcontractors to be exempted from carrying workers' compensation insurance in certain instances providing further protection for contractors and project owners.

*Do Pass 44-0 Senate; 64-10 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1252

**By Stanislawski (Senate) & Pfeiffer (House)**

Extends the sunset date on the Oklahoma Quality Events Act to 2021 and eliminates the requirement for an economic impact study for an event but instead requires actual documentation to compare the total amount of eligible local support with the total amount of incremental state sales tax revenue produced by the event. This should increase the number of quality events that can be attracted to Oklahoma which has a positive economic impact and improves the quality of life for more Oklahomans.

*Do Pass 29-5 Senate; 74-9 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1388

**By Treat/Pittman (Senate) & Thomsen (House)**

Creates the Small Wireless Facilities Deployment Act which creates rules to regulate the development of a 5G wireless network infrastructure in municipalities throughout Oklahoma. This will allow for more rapid deployment of very high-speed Internet access creating opportunities for economic development and improved quality of life for Oklahomans which will bring jobs and investment to the state.

*Do Pass 41-0 Senate; 86-1 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1475

**By Pugh (Senate) & Osburn/Cockroft/Hilbert (House)**

Creates the Occupational Licensing Advisory Commission to review occupational and professional licensing acts at least every four years. The bill is designed to reduce the barriers to individuals and businesses hoping to enter the market and create new jobs and opportunities in Oklahoma.

*Do Pass 42-1 Senate; 81-7 House; signed by Governor*

### SB 1576

**By Schulz/Simpson (Senate) & Ortega (House)**

Prohibits construction of wind energy facilities wherever they may reasonably hinder military operations. Military bases are a critical part of the Oklahoma economy. This bill is designed to protect the rights of private businesses while keeping our military bases free of restrictions and constraints that could cause the military to look to bases outside Oklahoma to fulfill their missions.

# BUDGET LARGELY DRIVES LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS

## OKLAHOMA CITY, OK, JUNE 8, 2018—

The Research Institute for Economic Development (RIED), a non-partisan organization and producer of the annual RIED Report, a grading system of Oklahoma legislators' votes on key economic development and business issues, announced today that only three members of the Oklahoma Legislature scored a perfect 100 on the 2018 RIED Report. The scores were awarded to lawmakers who served during the second regular session of the 56th Oklahoma Legislature, the 2017 first extraordinary session and the 2017/2018 second extraordinary session.

Senators receiving perfect scores are Senator Tom Dugger (SD 21) and Senator Ervin Yen (SD 40). Representative Elise Hall (HD 100) is the only member of the House of Representatives to receive a perfect score.

Under the RIED evaluation system, legislators earn points when they support job creation and economic development issues or vote against legislation that is harmful to job creation and economic development. A score of 70 and above represents a passing grade while 69 and below represents a failing grade.

Nineteen regular session measures were utilized to complete the 2018 RIED Report with one bill, HB 1033xx, the Step-Up Plan, heard during the second extraordinary session. The revenue-raising measure was introduced in the House, and while it received majority support during the final floor vote, it did not receive the required three-fourths 'supermajority' necessary to be enacted into law. The bill was amended in the Senate, and therefore was not utilized to compose Senate scoring.

"With two special legislative sessions and the second regular session, lawmakers had many issues facing them over the past several months, including filling two fiscal year budgets," said Mark Williams, RIED president. "Because of the unusual

circumstance of legislators being in session for nearly one year, coupled with intense debate on business-related bills such as HB 1033xx, the number of perfect scores this session is down markedly from past sessions. Furthermore, some legislative leaders, who traditionally have very high RIED scores, missed a high volume of votes due to the large amount of time they spent negotiating the final FY18 and FY19 budgets. Some lawmakers did, however, file anti-business measures intended to broaden the tax base by eliminating proven and viable business incentives. Moving forward it is imperative the legislature consider the true impact that a pro-business environment provides businesses looking to expand into Oklahoma."

Two House (HD 51, HD 61) and three Senate (SD 27, SD 30, SD 37) seats were vacant for at least a portion of the 2018 regular session. Despite this unusual occurrence, 99 legislative members still received passing scores of 70 or higher, including 36 Senate members (87%) and 63 House members (70%). Overall, 78% of the total legislative membership scored 70 or higher.

"The legislative sessions were challenging on many fronts, however that should not take away from legislators' mission of supporting a pro-growth and pro-business agenda," said Greg Love, RIED board chairman. "Although Oklahoma's economy is showing gradual signs of improvement, it does not erase the need for both the executive and legislative branches to seriously address budget reform and the manner in which fiscal decisions are made across state government. Next session presents a golden opportunity to address this extremely important issue, and I am hopeful the new legislative members, along with our new governor, will come ready to embrace policies and procedures that will advance Oklahoma forward economically. The time is now for that to occur."
